Gabrielle and her husband, Nate Drummond, own and operate Six River Farm in Bowdoinham. They lease 13 acres and own 7 acres of farmland all located along the shores of Merrymeeting Bay. They grow 9 acres of vegetables, herbs, and cut flowers, and 1 acre of berries. The remainder of their fields are used for crop rotation and cover cropping to keep their soils healthy. They grow over forty different crops and

sell the majority of their produce at farmers markets in Brunswick. The rest is sold to several restaurants and natural food stores in Bowdoinham, Brunswick, and Freeport.

Gabrielle says, "We are young farmers who are passionate about creating a healthy, ecologically sustainable food system here in Maine. We were drawn here by the fertile, rock-free soils, the beauty of the Bay, and proximity to good farmers markets. And as our farm grew, we felt increasingly attached to living and farming in such a beautiful place with such a vibrant, supportive community".

Cathy and her husband, Pete, own and operate Fairwinds Farm located in Topsham and Bowdoinham. They are headquartered on Augusta Road in Topsham where they have their farmstand, 5 greenhouses, 5 acres of crops, and their home. They also have 10 acres of strawberries and 40 acres of mixed vegetables along the beautiful Kennebec River in Bowdoinham. They sell seedlings and produce at four weekly Farmers Markets and at their Topsham farm stand. Their strawberry fields are open to the public, in season, for "Pick Your Own Strawberries".

Cathy says, "We have a mission with our farm. That mission is to Grow Top Quality Produce; Grow it Responsibly; and Sell it Reasonably Priced. We strive to make locally grown food affordable to all. We feel it should be a staple in every household, and not be considered a luxury".

These two women traveled different routes to get to where they are today, and their stories are fascinating. We look forward to hearing about their journeys, and seeing beautiful photos of their farms.

Life in capital cities was always interesting and sometimes challenging, but many of my best memories are of trips we took to the remains of ancient civilizations -- Mohenjodaro, Alexander's city of Ai-Khanum on the Oxus River, the giant Buddha statues of Bamyan (later destroyed), the hundreds of Buddhist stupas in Pagan and the Mughal Empire's Fatehpur Sikri. Travel to my first-love, Europe, was limited mostly to post-retirement.

Member #2: I'm a real Motown girl, born and raised in Detroit...attended a large downtown high school for technology, science and arts...same school as Diana Ross who was a year ahead. From that school of over 3,000 students, I went to a very small women's college in south central PA. During college I developed a love of travel, starting with a family trip to England and Wales to reconnect with both parents' relatives, a highlight being the reunion with Dad's family in Coventry, England (first time he had seen them since WWII), followed by summer study in Madrid, Spain. I moved to Maine with my husband in 1977; there ensued another reunion with his huge family in Friesland in the Netherlands. The travel bug continues: I take annual trips with a group of women who have latched onto the Mt. Ararat student trips and have gone to Germany-Austria-Switzerland, China, and London; this April I'm off to Scotland and Ireland. In our earlier years in Harpswell,

summer vacations were sailing trips with our two children. After 35 years here, now I look forward to an exciting year with the upcoming birth of my first grandson and my daughter's wedding. An active member of AAUW since the early 1970s in Georgetown, Mass. and our branch since coming to Maine, I've worked as a medical transcriptionist, newspaper reporter, and bilingual secretary for a large pharmaceutical company and have been involved with Harpswell Community TV and served as a library assistant at Mt. Ararat for many years.

Member #3 was born and raised in MA where she lived two blocks away from her grandparents. Both grandmothers, the "Italian one" and the "American one" were fabulous cooks, and they planted the seed in her that grew into a love of cooking. She found a passion for sailing during her summers on the Vineyard as a camper and a counselor, and after college, while living in Boston, she could be found regularly sailing on the Charles. She met her husband while both were students in college, and she spent a year chasing one of his friends until her future hubby caught her! Like many others in the area, Uncle Sam brought her and her husband to BNAS. They had often talked about settling in a small NE college town and knew as soon as they arrived here that Brunswick would be home.
