#1) "I grew up on a western Maine dairy farm that continues in operation and has been in the family for eight generations now. In 4-H and showing cattle at Maine fairs until college, I went to a two-room school through eighth grade. It was there I decided I wanted to be a teacher when I became the substitute teacher in the "little room" (k-3) as an eighth grader. I have always loved teaching. Currently I volunteer in Portland helping Central African asylum seekers to improve their English. I find that very rewarding. My husband passed away several years ago; I have two adult daughters."

#2) "I was first generation born in the Bronx in 1936 into a working class family, attending public schools. Afternoons I went to Secular Jewish school to learn Jewish culture and the language. I went on to NY Technical College. After graduating, I worked in the pathology department at Memorial Sloan Kettering Hospital in NYC. For pleasure I participated in International Folk Dancing then met my future husband in 1958. I marched three times for Pro-Choice in Washington, DC."

#3 was expelled from kindergarten in Edinburgh, Scotland for refusing to wear part of the uniform: the black bloomers. She won a Rotary Foundation Fellowship for graduate work in Geneva, Switzerland, then taught freshman history at the Woman's College of UNC (now the University of North Carolina at Greensboro). She also served as a United Nations guide but her true claim to fame is that she appeared as a contestant on the 1950's TV show, Name That Tune, winning \$200!
